



Pastoral Care | Gofal Bugeiliol

Pastoral care and good relationships are vital ingredients in getting the best out of students and allowing them to maximise their potential. The welfare of students is the prime concern of all our staff and the school has a carefully structured, successful pastoral care system. This is based around the form tutor who is involved with the students on a daily basis. Tutors are supported by Heads of Year, who have overall responsibility for the care and guidance of a particular year group.

The Head of Year 7 and an Assistant Headteacher are responsible for the transition from primary school, which includes visits and meetings for new students and their parents/carers. Every parent/carer and student therefore has access to staff who will listen to their concerns and who will be able to give assistance and advice.

The school has an extensive pastoral system, which in addition to the Head of Year and Form Tutor involves an Additional Needs Learning Hub, and a pastoral support corridor. On this corridor students can find the members of the leadership team responsible for wellbeing and inclusion, alongside the Learning Support Base, the Reset Room, the Family Engagement Officer, the Pupil Assistance Leads and our Learning Coaches. All of these staff and support rooms are available to students based on referrals from teaching staff/Head of Year.

- Grey skirt (logo preferred)
- Grey tailored trousers (no logo required)
- Grey tailored shorts (knee length no logo required)
- Grey, black or navy socks/grey or black tights
- A pale blue shirt (a pale blue polo shirt can be worn in the summer term only - no logo required)
- A navy V neck sweater (logo preferred)
- The school tie (not needed with a polo shirt)
- A navy blue blazer with the school logo (optional)

Sixth Form

- A black skirt (knee length no logo required)
- Black tailored trousers (no logo required)
- Black socks/Black opaque tights
- A white shirt
- A black V neck sweater (no logo required)

Students are encourage to take part in the many extra-curricular activities which exist in school. There is a very strong tradition tradition of music at Caerleon Comprehensive. We have a full school orchestra, choirs, wind band, brass ensemble and big band.

Our musicians have achieved national success at the Music for Youth National Festival, including a performance at the Youth Prom in the Royal Albert Hall.

There is also a strong tradition of sporting excellence at Caerleon, and there are school teams in all major sports, organised in each year, and students are actively encouraged to participate. Many of our students gain representative honours at Newport County and national levels in a huge variety of sports. Our PE department take pride in knowing student's skills well and encouraging them to pursue sports and activities they may not have had experience of yet.

A wide variety of clubs associated with academic departments are also to be found. An up to date list, including days and times, can be found on the school website.

A number of educational trips are organised, including local, national and foreign visits to support work covered in the curriculum. Touring opportunities are also offered with the various sports teams. The trip overview on the website is a useful document to view in relation to trips and visits.

A large number of students participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. This involves completing four different sections: volunteering, physical activity, skills and expedition, all of which have their own challenges. The volunteering section in particular raises awareness of social responsibility with involvement in the local community. The school is committed to an extensive fund raising programme in support of local, national and international charities. A number of whole school initiatives are organised throughout the year as well as individual and form group activities.


It is very important to us at Caerleon Comprehensive School that we listen to our students.

The student council is an important group who meet to share the views of students within their year groups. We also have a Pride group who work with staff to ensure that the voices of our LGBTQ+ students are heard, as well as an Eco group who work to make our school more environmentally friendly.

Groups such as Criw Cymraeg and Digital Leaders help us to take forward strategies for improvement in the Welsh language and our Cynefin, as well as the digital competency of our community.

Every year our students complete the PASS survey, which allows us to understand how happy they are in school and the areas where we need to do better. We also undertake the SHRN survey at regular intervals.

Years Seven to Nine

From September 2023, both years seven and eight will follow the new Curriculum for Wales. This is based around the four purposes, aiming to ensure students become ambitious, capable learners; enterprising, creative contributors; ethical, informed citizens; and healthy confident individuals. Our curriculum is created around the cross cutting themes, which prepare students for life in a modern Wales. These themes are: Relationships and Sexuality education (RSE); Human Rights; Diversity; Careers and work related experiences; Local, National and international contexts. The curriculum is also based on several cross curricular skills frameworks: the literacy and numeracy framework and the digital competence framework. Our skilled teaching staff have worked collaboratively with each other and with other practitioners and leaders within Newport and Wales, to create a curriculum which is exciting, innovative and that teaches students what really matters.

From September 2024, year nine will also follow Curriculum for Wales,.

Years Ten and Eleven

In year nine, students are able to select the subjects they wish to study at GCSE level. Many subjects remain compulsory, and are known as the core offer. For three of their choices however, students undertake a free choice survey, allowing them to choose the three non-core subjects they wish to opt for at GCSE level. This choice is guided to ensure that students still have a broad, balanced base from which to progress to AS and A2 Level studies and other Level 3 courses. Compulsory subjects include English, Maths, Science, Welsh, Welsh Baccalaureate Qualification, Physical Education and Religious Studies. These are supplemented by three other subjects of the students' choice. Setting by ability will take place at GCSE level, within core subjects and sometimes within noncore subjects also, depending on the nature of the subject. All students are expected to participate in external examinations at the end of the course

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Sixth Form

In year eleven, students are provided with guidance to allow them to select the subjects they wish to study within the Sixth Form. Sixth Formers have a selection of options to choose from for study at Caerleon, and we also work with Llanwern High School, so students can opt to study a variety of subjects at this establishment also. A school bus takes the students back and forth to any lessons taken at Llanwern High School.

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School Admissions Mynediadau Ysgol

Caerleon Comprehensive School operates under the Newport Local Educations Authority's policy on admissions.

Students in their final year of primary school (Year 6) are invited to Caerleon Comprehensive School for a tour of the school and sample lessons in a variety of subjects. An Open Evening, to which parents and students are invited, is held in the Autumn term and there is a meeting for parents of new intake students in July.

If you decide not to apply for your catchment school at all, this could increase the chances of your child not being allocated a place at a school of your choice. How to apply

Admissions to Year 7:

Students transfer from primary to secondary school at the start of the school year in which they will reach their twelfth birthday. Parents can express a preference for any secondary school, but there is no guarantee of admission to the chosen school, even if it is the catchment school.

All completed application forms must be returned directly to the School Admissions Team at the Civic Centre, and not to the school. Applications for admissions can be completed online. Visit https://www.newport.gov.uk/en/Schools-Education/Schools/Applyfor-a-place/Apply-for-a-Place.aspx for further information.

Mid-year Transfers:

Parents may wish to transfer their child from their existing school to Caerleon Comprehensive School during the academic year. Parents must complete the transfer request form obtained from the Admissions Team, or via the admissions website.

Sixth Form Admissions:

Students apply following the Post 16 Open Evening. We welcome students from outside of our catchment that have studied GCSE elsewhere.

External applicants will be asked to fill out an application form which is available on our website. Students will need to provide proof of GCSE results when enrolling.

In order to embark upon a demanding programme of advanced study at Level 3, students should have achieved a good all round level of performance at GCSE. As such, the minimum requirement for consideration for Level 3 courses is five GCSE subjects at grade C or above, excluding short courses. It is to be noted that many subjects have individual requirements where a B or above is required to study the subject. Please check the latest requirements on our website.


